Rector's Letter

Advent begins this Sunday with all its anticipation and waiting.

We all want to know what's coming our way.

To this end we keep our ear to the ground, we read the papers, we listen to office gossip. What's on its way may be good. It may be bad. The future is filled with the possibility of promise or judgement. Or a bit of both. It's that official looking envelope which comes through the post that we're half scared to open.

We're all for promise. But what about judgment? The last time we were caught short and had our performance or motivations criticized it hurt like hell. We'd pop into a side room before we entered into one of those conversations willingly – to find out that someone had a bone to pick with us, or that they needed to tell us something which required that we sat down first or had a witness present – that we'd been hurtful or destructive or that we just didn't get what the point of our job was or our marriage vows or our priorities.

"A word in your ear please?"

"Uh, no, maybe later...."

There is a place, though, where promises and judgement intersect. The promise of anything new threatens what's old and obsolete and quite comfortable. We get used to certain ways of life even if they're way below par and we stagnate - as my grandfather used to say: "It may be an ugly dog but it's my dog". And when the boss has said his worst and we've been apprised of our faults, what then? Well, sir, everybody knows where he stands and there are pieces to be picked up and the possibility of breathing in air which has finally been cleared.

Promise and threat sometimes begin to look like each other.

That's not really the choice we have. It's a choice between judgment and promise on one hand or staying exactly the same - with our secrets untold and our promise unfulfilled.

In the worst case scenario the future is filled with the same damned thing repeating itself endlessly.

And surely in a season of anticipation, anything would be better than that.

Penicuik for Africa (PfA)

Our AGM at the beginning of November was well attended (18 present and nearly as many apologies) with St. James-ites providing only half of those present (but all the apologies!). The treasurer reported that we had £650 in our general (Children of Africa) account and £1465 in our Chitambo Midwifery School Appeal Fund. Sales of Traidcraft goods were down slightly at £1100 but the discount (10%) swells funds and sales help African producers, so please buy from us where you can and watch out for new lines and stocking fillers in your Christmas preparations! Two important decisions were made.

Charitable status The first was to seek charitable status in our own right rather than rely on the status of our two main supporting churches, St. James & North Kirk, while recognising our continued need for their support. Charitable status enhances our fund-raising capacity, particularly needed in the light of the second decision, to press ahead with a major project, the re-opening of Chitambo Midwifery School in Zambia at a cost of £200,000-300,000! If successful it will save lives while boosting the fragile Chitambo economy.

Fund-raising for Chitambo We have set ourselves a target of raising £26,000 in a year but will obviously need other organisations to help us find the rest. We are currently bidding for a grant of £14,000 to do a feasibility study of what is required to re-open the Midwifery School. Meantime we are scaling up our fund-raising, beginning with a **Christmas Card Appeal**, similar to the one which got our Ambulance Appeal off to such a good start. Martin Naylor's 'The Touch Agency' has generously gifted 1000 cards and we are asking £1 each for them. They carry a beautiful picture of a Chitambian mother with well-swaddled, newborn child, under 'garlands' of rolled mosquito nets: the picture was taken by Paul Vallis on the trip to present the ambulance. Cards can be obtained on Sundays from the Traidcraft stall, which will soon be selling pots of Hyacinths and Christmas Table Decorations as of yore. In mid-January (probably the afternoon of Sunday 17th), we will be holding a '**Pampered Chef**' **Cookery Show** in Howgate Village Hall and in the Spring, another **Sponsored Slim** will be hitting the headlines and waistlines: further details of the latter will appear in the February Outreach.

There was a brief temporary period between Mrs. Mac and Mike when Dr. Monelle took over the keyboard, but otherwise there was just Mrs. Mac of sacred memory. I and both our sons, Simon and Tony were choristers under her guidance, and should they ever miss a Sunday, you could rely on seeing Mr. Mac trundling round the corner that afternoon with Mrs. Mac to find out where they had been. She was great on 'Tablet' too. But one of the things that I remember best and cherish was her sensitive playing, especially at funerals. And then Mike took over, and I recall his first concert version of Joseph and the Technicolour Dreamcoat with a young Fraser Charlton as Joseph and Angus Palmer rejoicing in his Elvis impersonation as Pharaoh. Since then I have watched with admiration, tinged with envy, as the choir has gone from strength to strength; now it rests under the capable baton of David, and I am sure will continue to flourish for the next fifty years as it well deserves.

An interesting book

The author follows in the footsteps of John Moschos, a 6th C monk, on his journeys across the entire Eastern Byzantine world in 578AD as recorded in "The Spiritual Meadow" which is Moschos' account of that journey from Judea throughout the Middle East to Alexandria.

Starting from the Monastery of Iviron on Mount Athos, Greece, where the oldest surviving manuscript is housed, Dalrymple travels through Turkey, Syria, Lebanon, Israel and Egypt, talking to ordinary Christians, Jews and Muslims as well as monks and clerical leaders, visiting many intriguing sites along the way.

"From the Holy Mountain - A Journey in the Shadow of Byzantium", his acclaimed study of the demise of Christianity in its Middle Eastern homeland, was awarded the Scottish Arts Council Autumn Book Award for 1997; it was also shortlisted for the 1998 Thomas Cook Award, the

John Llewellyn Rhys Prize and the Duff Cooper Prize. William Dalrymple is a Scot and Cambridge graduate, he spent his final year studying Hiberno-Saxon art and realised that early medieval art of Britain was, almost certainly, developed from that of the monasteries in the east Mediterranean.

I think you would enjoy it.

Tuesday A 'Car Boot Shop' in the Precinct opens, as it does daily, to allow congregations and community groups to recycle their unwanted goods and subsidise the community care given by the churches.

Wednesday - morning 'Home Teams' assemble in 'Idyls for the Elderly', run by Area Council or Presbytery, where those no longer able to live independently and who cannot access one of the increasingly rare places in statutory residential homes receive care from professionally supervised volunteers.

- *evening* It's not all grind. Top of Vestry agenda is planning for the 25th fun-for-all 'Caboodle' in the church grounds. Previous events were a great success, bringing together parents and children from churches, nursery groups, Rainbows and Brownies for a variety of activities, none more popular than 'Drown The Rat' (participants purchase water (10 euro per litre), climb the stepladder and pour the lot down a drainpipe over the rector, suitably clad in Souwester, cape & wellies) and to mark jubilee year, the Bishop will be invited to 'drown'. At least the water is warm, heated by the battery of solar panels on the south-facing roof of the church and supplying surrounding houses with cheap hot water (none to spare on Caboodle Day though!)

Thursday A small group work in the church grounds under the direction of a shared gardener, funded by all the churches. Today's tasks are to tend the 'sensory garden' a blessing for the partially sighted round about, and add a slide to the soft-fall play area. Others are busy on the church allotments: they compare methods with our guests from Chitambo, here as part of the biennial twinning exchange, who suggest that we buy a goat.

Friday - morning it's time for the weekend 'Shopathon' a bulk-buy expedition to the hypermarket on the outskirts of Edinburgh where the individual requirements noted by the Care and Home teams can be purchased and delivered, along with a prayer.

- *evening* it's just as well the walls are thick! 'The Crypt' has become the place to be on a Friday night, an imaginative conversion of the cavernous space under the floor of the church. Tickets can only be obtained at the brief Taize-style worship upstairs: sometimes there are no scripture readings, sometimes no prayers and sometimes no hymns, just images- tonight it's the regrowth of the polar ice caps. What began as a 15-minute meditation has tripled in length by popular request, a price well worth paying.

Saturday - evening it's St James turn to do the ACTS Carolcade. Gone are the days when it needed a police escort but community wardens are in the background to maintain order, if required. We traditionally end each session with a 'Caroloke' in one of the pubs and that night we will end up in 'The Crown'.

Sunday Neighbours on the adjoining St James estate trickle through their requested access gate in the church wall for the Mass Carol. Attendance has gradually grown as the church became a community resource rather than a club for the chosen few. Preparations are announced for the Christmas Shelter- when 'The Crypt' will provide a temporary home for some of Edinburgh's homeless. One of last year's sheltered will act as warden. As worshippers leave, they see our motto on the door- 'Permanent change is here to stay'- and a few whisper 'Amen'.
