Rector’s Letter

The really notable moments we spent in Israel in the month of July all had some connection to water. We live here, let’s face it, in a wet country. The green colour of the hillsides in Scotland (and in Britain generally) is of an intensity unrivalled around the world. It draws your attention as your plane comes in to land on your very first visit to the UK.

“I can’t believe it’s so green”, says the lady from Baltimore in the seat behind you.

Not so in Israel. And while it may be a dryer place now than it was at various moments on the Bible Time Chart, water has always been a treasured commodity. Wars have been fought over it, and the fortunes of societies decided on the basis of the proximity of springs coursing deep within the porous limestone and gushing forth from the foot of a cliff, or welling up within a deep depression. Springs within the desert become the metaphor chosen for the surprising redemptive acts of God within human history. It contains in its image the idea of “surprise” – something that you happen upon, something which was hidden and then revealed.

The course of water here in Scotland follows the usual intuitive path. It falls as pretty constant rain in four seasons and then flows down on the surface into a lake or river that eventually issues forth into the sea. In Israel, one must add to the equation the fact that precipitation so often disappears into the rock after falling at great height, only to appear later and often in the very driest and most inhospitable of locations. The springs which flow from the cave which was once dedicated to Pan, the

god of the countryside, flows from the rock at a temperature of 14.5 degrees – icy cold when the outside temperature is nearly 45 degrees – cold as the heart of the mountain. The surprise is physical as you wade into it. It takes your breath away. There are fish in the river near the cave which exist nowhere else in the world other than this first very cold stretch of the stream.

The upper Jordan, flowing into the Sea of Galilee near Bethsaida, is rich in bird life and filled with fish. It supports impassable banks of papyrus and rushes. From a height, though, it becomes clear that this band of life is narrow – inconceivable without the life-giving constant flow of water.

Nachal David is a small stream which flows from a mountain cleft at a point between Qumran and Masada, in a landscape which would appear as lifeless as the surface of Mars were it not for the circling vultures overhead. Your car comes along a curve in the road and you happen upon a vertical slash of green running down each side of a waterfall - life where little life was expected to be. This stream enters into a series of pools as it flows down the mountainside. In these pools are frogs and crabs and small snails which have followed their own unique path of evolution across the ages.

The word 'source' has been denatured in our language. For us it means simply 'beginning', and the source of happiness, joy, pride, inspiration and meaning is somewhere out there. Things come to us in predictable ways and when they don't – when the banks have failed or the economy has taken a tumble, when our health has taken a turn for the worse or our relationship with a dependable friend has soured - we are inclined to say – “well that's it, then, isn't it. I had it and now it's gone – all I can see is the riverbed and manky seaweed.”

A source appears from within – from the depths – in a forgotten place – in an isolated and rarely visited place. You know already – that some people who have been beaten up by events and misfortunes are not 'down for the count'. Some who have lived lives of relative ease are overturned with relatively small misfortunes. Sometimes it's a matter of relative strength – the force and nature of the constitutions of different people. But sometimes we wonder if there aren't people in the world who have discovered within themselves or within some depth of hidden discourse - some 'source' of strength which is beyond themselves but

strangely within themselves at the same time. They are nourished by quiet. They spend some times with their eyes closed. They read and listen and wander not to be entertained but, rather, to discover.

There are examples within our own community of St James' and St Mungo's of this – of people who have wandered in dry and desolate places but who can tell you that God has placed in their paths wonderful and surprising encounters – “Grace” if you like and “Abundance” in quantities that the threat of illness and loss and reversal cannot dry up. Grace which keeps on flowing – Grace which has a long and venerable history in the Household of Faith.

Penicuik for Africa (PfA)

Street Fair Stall - despite the clash with the BBQ, some of you managed to support our stall at the street fair, which provided a good opportunity to advertise our forthcoming Africa Fair and Chitambo Midwifery School project. Thanks for your help!

Penicuik Arts Festival - This had an African theme and included a showing in the Town Hall of the classic film 'u-Carmen e Khayalitsha' on August 23rd: a spectacle of music, singing and dance from the Cape township. You may just have time to catch the display of 'Children's Images of Africa' in The Drum, Penicuik Library until Aug 30th but we hope to 'nab' them for our Fair. At the Craigiefield Hotel, there will be an evening performance by 5-man African band 'Makossa' (reggae, rock and more) on Friday September 4th, followed by an afternoon 'Celebration of Africa' on September 5th at which the African Ladies choir, 'Zawadi', will top the bill. We will have a side-stall to publicise PfA activities at the latter event and any support will be most welcome.

3rd Africa Fair - This is not far away now (Saturday September 26th). We should have 15 Africa-friendly organisations represented in the Town Hall for the morning event (11.00am -1.00pm). If you are free on the day and not involved in any of the stalls, please let me know and we will find you a job among the following: guiding stall-holders to their places in the upper Town Hall (10.00am); serving on the PfA stall; selling raffle tickets; helping children with handicrafts; face painting;

serving coffee & lunches (we will have some pavement tables, weather permitting), washing dishes, helping to clear the hall (from 1.30pm). I will try to arrange briefing meetings for helpers on the previous Sunday (20th) after morning service and at Youth Group in the evening. Alternatively, you may wish to come along simply to be enthused by the many and varied efforts of others to improve the quality of life in Africa while soaking up an atmosphere, alive with its colours, music and crafts. There will be fun for the younger ones in the form of African storytelling, face painting and a collage competition.

Chitambo Midwifery School Project - we need to grasp a few nettles on this one and I suggest that we do this at an AGM. Last year only three people turned up for our AGM and if that happens again we must seriously question the sustainability of PfA. Can I therefore suggest 7.30pm on the first Wednesday in November (the 4th) in St James Church Hall as a provisional time and place: please let me know if this a bad choice for you and suggest alternatives. Past business can be wrapped up in 30 minutes, leaving time to plan our fund-raising, the quest for funding partners and to consider whether we need to become a charity to enhance our credibility.

Bannockburn RDA Centre

It might seem strange amidst so much human tragedy to be asking your prayers for animals. However, many people are aware of the work done by Riding for the Disabled and some of you know that our daughter, Helen, works at the Bannockburn RDA Centre. Recently, the Centre was hit by a severe outbreak of Equine Grass Sickness, which resulted in the deaths of four working horses within a few days and temporary closure. This meant loss of facilities for around 150 who attend each week.

Fortunately, the Centre has reopened, with revised class schedules. They need to restock, and instigate new feeding regimes with additional supplements and probiotics at key times of the year. Generously, one pony has been donated and another is on continuing loan. The young people who are served by the Centre are greatly shocked at what happened, as are all staff and volunteers. The RDA meets the needs of those who are physically disabled, but also those who are “troubled in mind and spirit”, as youngsters are often referred by social services.

Please keep the Centre, its staff and users in your thoughts as they strive to get back on their feet to continue their invaluable work.

"You are the One!"

I have for some years been a "pen friend" of some prisoners in Zambia. These men are not prisoners of conscience, but convicted and (police torture discounted) guilty criminals serving a prison sentence. They are humans and live in a country where there is much poverty and few jobs. Most of these men have come to Christian faith and far be it from me to condemn. One of these prisoners told me that our contact had made him feel he was a human being, and one can see that in the degrading and de-personalising life of a Zambian prison, possibly on death row, just a little encouragement and TLC from outside can have great results.

Out of the blue, a couple of weeks ago, I received within a week no less than four letters from Zambian prisoners unknown to me. All of them were miserable and lonely, but all with the hope that their request for a pen friend might be met. One of the letters took the strong line "YOU ARE THE ONLY ONE who could comprehend my request and finally intervene into my predicament ". I don't want to turn these chaps away, but, unfortunately, I have definitely reached the limit and there is no way I can cope with another prisoner!

Could it be that YOU ARE THE ONE? Would you consider taking up your pen to write a friendly line to one of these men? This would only be to one prisoner. Women can do the job as well as men, if not better! We have surely in this IT age not lost the ability to write a simple letter. Lorna Bramley and David Bachop have both taken a prisoner on recently in addition to any other correspondents. There is obviously a need, which one person can't meet and I have decided to make a public request in this way to St Mungo's and St James and do hope and pray that there will be a response! I can show you the letters and you can choose whom to write to.

Papermaking in Penicuik

The Penicuik Historical Society has been awarded a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund to manage a project to mark the 300th anniversary of the start of papermaking in Penicuik and on the North Esk River. The project is being developed in conjunction with other local organisations, and is organising an exhibition in Penicuik Town Hall from 6 – 10 October this year, and an associated events programme.

The industry became vital to the development of the area both economically and socially. It is forty years since Eskmills closed and thirty-three years since Valleyfield and Pomathorn Mills closed. At one time there were approximately 1200 – 1300 people employed in the industry, in the Penicuik area and for nearly 300 years, Penicuik was known as 'The Papermaking Town'. The era of papermaking ended with the closure of Dalmore, the last mill on the Esk, which ceased production in 2004.

One of the main activities is recording and preserving the living memories of paperworkers who worked in the Penicuik mills. If you used to work in one of the mills and would be willing to be interviewed about your working life, we would be delighted to hear from you.

Mad Scientists' Corner

I saw the following article in a recent edition of the prestigious scientific journal, the Journal of Cell Science. It was written by Martin Schwartz, Department of Microbiology, University of Virginia, and was entitled 'The importance of stupidity in scientific research'. However, I saw in his article a number of parallels between what he said about science, and between faith and belief. Here is a somewhat condensed version of what he had to say.

I recently saw an old friend of mine for the first time in many years. We had been PhD students at the same time, both studying science, but in different areas. She later dropped out of graduate school, went to Harvard Law School, and is now a senior lawyer for a major environmental organisation. The conversation turned to why she had dropped out of graduate school. To my utter astonishment, she said it was 'because it made her feel stupid'. After a couple of years of feeling stupid, she was ready to do something else.

I had thought of her as one of the brightest people I knew, and her subsequent career supported that view. What she said bothered me, and I kept thinking about it. Sometime the next day, it hit me. Science makes me feel stupid too! It's just that I'd become used to it. So used to it that I actively seek out new opportunities to be stupid! Let me explain. For most scientists, one of the reasons we like science is that we were good at it at school and college. But there was also a fascination with

understanding the physical world and a need to discover new things, too. In school, doing well at science meant taking courses and getting the right answers in tests. If you know the answers, you do well, and feel smart.

A PhD is a different thing. You have to frame questions that will lead to significant discoveries, design and interpret experiments so that the conclusions are convincing, foresee difficulties and see ways around them, or (failing that) solve them when they occurred. For a while, whenever I ran into a problem, I pestered the professors in my department who were experts in the areas I was researching. I remember the day when Henry Taube (who won the Nobel Prize two years later) told me he didn't know how to solve the problem I was having in my work. I figured Taube knew 1000 times more than I did. If he didn't have the answer, nobody did.

That's when it hit me. Nobody did!

That was why it was a research problem. And since it was my research problem, it was up to me to solve it. Once I faced the fact, I solved the problem in a couple of days. The crucial lesson was that the scope of things I didn't know wasn't merely vast – it was infinite! Instead of being discouraging, I found this realisation liberating. If our ignorance is infinite, our only course of action is to muddle through as best we can. What makes research difficult is being immersed in the unknown. We can't be sure whether we're even asking the right questions or doing the right experiment until we get the result of what we're doing. If we don't feel stupid, we're not really trying!

Now there are different kinds of stupidity. There's 'relative stupidity', where the other students in the class actually read the material, think about it, and fly through the exam. There's also the 'stupidity' where bright people are working in an area that doesn't match their talents and expertise.

But science involves confronting our 'absolute stupidity'. That kind of stupidity is inherent in our efforts to push our way into the unknown. Examiners of a research thesis will push and push until the student starts getting the answers wrong, or gives up and says 'I don't know'. The point of these exams is not to see if the student gets all the answers right. The point is to identify the student's weaknesses... in part, to ensure that the student's knowledge fails at a sufficiently high level for them to be awarded a research degree.

Focussing on important questions of science puts us in the awkward position of being ignorant. No doubt this can be difficult for students who are accustomed to getting the answers right. But the more

comfortable we become with being stupid, the deeper we will wade into the unknown, and the more likely we are to make big discoveries.

Now, I'd like you to go back and read the last two paragraphs of this article again, but this time, substitute the word 'science' with the words 'faith' or 'belief'!

From the Rock Trust

The letter below also gave information about a meeting in mid August of those interested, which sadly was received too late for the previous edition of "Outreach", but I'm sure the Trust will still welcome contact! - Ed.

"Dear Supporter,

In October, the Rock Trust's new NightStop project will begin to provide overnight accommodation to young people who are in need of breathing space from their current home. This service is unique to Edinburgh, and is a branch of the Depaul Nightstop Uk service which has provided over 5800 nights of accommodation through 300 host households in the past year. This has all been done through local Nightstop initiatives such as the one we now proudly introduce.

The Rock Trust's *Nightstop* is a new way of thinking when addressing youth homelessness in Edinburgh, and it attempts to prevent those who are vulnerable from entering the chaotic world of homelessness services where suitable. By allowing young people who (for example) have fallen out with their family, neighbours or had an argument in their care home, to stay with a host household for between 1 and 3 nights, we prevent them from being exposed to temporary bed and breakfast or adult hostel accommodation. All referrals come from agencies that have known the young person for a long period of time and are heavily monitored and risk assessed. All volunteers undergo a minimum of 10 hours training and are regularly supervised, and have 24 hour contact with staff when hosting.

We are now in the process of recruiting volunteer host households for this new project. we look forward to sharing our hopes with you."
